### Line 3 Pipeline Replacement Project January 9, 2017



Q: Where can I get a map of a potential pipeline route that goes by my house? I want to see where the pipeline might be routed relative to my home and property.

A: There are currently two options for viewing maps of potential routes for the Line 3 project, and we are working on a third. Enbridge's [route permit application](#) contains maps for its preferred route. You can view and download maps from the application.

You can view all routing options on an interactive web map on the [Department of Commerce Line 3 webpage](#). Click on the map and navigate to your area of the state. You can zoom in and out; you can view different map layers on the map. You can print a map. In addition to the interactive web map, we are working to develop a mapbook for all routing options. We hope to complete the mapbook and have it available on the Line 3 webpage by the end of January 2017.

Q: What is the current schedule for the environmental review and hearing process? When is Enbridge's initial hearing testimony due? Will everyone be able to download and read this testimony?

A: The current schedule for the environmental review and hearing process is captured in the administrative law judge's [third prehearing order dated October 28, 2016](#). The administrative law judge for the Line 3 project is Judge Ann C. O'Reilly.

Enbridge's initial hearing testimony (the "Applicant's Direct Testimony") is due on January 31, 2017. The testimony will be electronically filed and will be available for viewing by all persons through the Commission's eDockets system. The Commission's certificate of need docket for Line 3 is: [CN-14-916](#). The Commission's route permit docket for Line 3 is: [PPL-15-137](#). Some information in Enbridge's testimony may be designated by them as trade secret. Trade secret information is not viewable by the general public. However, when trade secret information is included in a filing, a public version of the filing, with the trade secret information redacted, must also be provided.
