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MR. JEFFREY DAVEAU, SR.: My name is

Jeffrey Daveau. J-E-F-F-R-E-Y, D-A-V-E-A-U. And

I'm a senior. I live at 6260 Seville Road, Saginaw,

Minnesota 55779?

I'm here as a resident of Minnesota and also an officer of the Duluth Building and Construction Trade and a member of the Plumbers and Steamfitters Local 11, representing 700 members just in the plumbers and steamfitters.

We work in northern Minnesota, northern Wisconsin. These projects are very financially beneficial to the men and women I represent on the installation, fabrication, and maintenance of these systems.

I want to voice my support of the proposed Line 3 pipeline replacement project in Minnesota. The need for the pipeline has easily been shown by the demand for fuel used in transportation. One example is people that came to the hearing to speak in favor and opposition drove cars and trucks that used the very fuels that are in question.

The American economy is still very dependent on fossil fuel; and until that changes and we have a real alternative to fossil fuels that can

be used by all, we will be transporting these fuels by one means or another.

The concern for spills of the pipeline is continually being addressed by Enbridge by using smart pigs checking the pipelines; new, improved materials that last longer for the pipes; and the coatings on any of the new installations.

The safest and most economic means of transporting fuels is by pipeline. The Line 3 replacement is a needed project to continue a safe means of sending oil that would not be a burden on the taxpayers, unlike updating the railroad infrastructure that we'll be asking the taxpayers to help subsidize the much needed improvements to try to keep rail traffic safe.

The pipelines very seldom run through very populated areas, unlike railcars and trucks that are also transporting the fuels. If an accident happens while a train or a truck is going through a town or near a school, the loss of life and injuries could be huge where, on the other hand, the pipe may have a leak; and with the newly-updated systems on the pipeline, it would have minimal health and danger of life as a result. The cleanup would be the burden of the pipeline company and not

the taxpayers.

I also feel that Enbridge is being a good steward for our environment by replacing the pipeline before it has leaking issues by cleaning the existing pipeline in the ground and abandoning the old pipeline in place. It is less evasive to the area that the other pipelines are currently running through.

As a homeowner in Minnesota and a representative of Plumbers and Steamfitters Local 11, I ask to please approve the much-needed project not only for work of my members, but also for the safety of the State of Minnesota.

Pipelines are the safest means of moving the projects across the country.

MR. JOHN FISHER-MERRITT: My name is John Fisher-Merritt. J-O-H-N. F-I-S-H-E-R, dash, M-E-R-R-I-T-T.

Okay. I'm a farmer in Carlton County; and I originally got into this fight, attempting to prevent the Sandpiper from crossing my organic farm. But I think the stakes are higher than my first real concern. I think that the DIS -- or is it the DEIS -- okay -- falls short of addressing the impact of the proposed Line 3 expansion and relocation.

You notice I didn't say replacement.

In terms of the social cost of carbon, a 30-year time span would result in costs around 287 billion, according to the EIS, proposed EIS. However, many pipelines operate for 60 years. Therefore, the DEIS should include climate costs that assume a 60-year or greater lifespan, more like \$600 billion instead of 287.

The DEIS should not take Enbridge's word for it that the pipe would be monitored indefinitely. I think the pipe, which is a major concern of tribes and landowners, the old Line 3 pipe, would be ignored indefinitely, instead of monitored indefinitely.

And that's all I wanted to say. I could talk on more and more, but I know that time is of the essence.

MR. GALEN SILLAMPA: Galen Sillampa.

G-A-L-E-N, first name. Sillampa, S as in Sam, I as in issue, L as in Larry, L as in Larry, A as in apple, M as in Mary, P as in Paul, A as in apple.

Please consider expanding the pipeline. We all need to pray to our highest power for guidance in all that we do, trusting in him to do his bidding. There is sufficient oil in this

country so that we do not have to rely so heavily on foreign imports.

MR. ARNOLD COLLMAN: Arnold Collman,
C-O-L-L-M-A-N. I'm retired from the county highway
department. I worked there 30 years. To me it's a
no-brainer. If I worked for Enbridge -- this is
if -- I would shut all the pipelines off, down
completely, because that's what I'm hearing here.
We don't -- people are saying we don't need
pipelines. Shut them off; then see what happens.
But our whole society runs on petroleum.

And I made a comment in the Pine Journal at a meeting similar to this, that if you live in the woods, ride a bicycle to town, you don't need oil.

But I got a question. How many bicycles do you see in the parking lot? I see one. The rest are cars and trucks.

Okay. Pipelines move oil pretty safely.

And until something better comes along, there isn't

much of a choice, is there?

That's it.

MR. CHUCK NELSON: The name is Chuck Nelson, C-H-U-C-K, N-E-L-S-O-N.

Another pipeline proposal -- it seems to

me Minnesota is crisscrossed with pipelines. No doubt some have been necessary. Today, however, we are entering a time when renewable energy -- when renewables, energy efficiency, and conservation are clearly demonstrating a wiser course.

At this time, rather than risking
Minnesota land and waters to allow investors to
profit from the tar in Canada, let us be prudent,
deny the permit for Enbridge 3, encourage safer
renewables. In ten years there will likely be
pipeline removal proposals.
