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MR. CHUCK NELSON: The name is Chuck Nelson, C-H-U-C-K, N-E-L-S-O-N. Another pipeline proposal -- it seems to me Minnesota is crisscrossed with pipelines. No doubt some have been necessary.

Today, however, we are entering a time when renewable energy -- when renewables, energy efficiency, and conservation are clearly demonstrating a wiser course.

At this time, rather than risking
Minnesota land and waters to allow investors to
profit from the tar in Canada, let us be prudent,
deny the permit for Enbridge 3, encourage safer
renewables. In ten years there will likely be
pipeline removal proposals.

MS. AIMEE MERINO: My first name is
Aimee, A-I-M-E-E. Last name is Merino, M-E-R-I-N-O.
I'm from Woodbury, Minnesota, and I'm here today
because I oppose the pipeline.

For one thing I think that in this time where climate change is a major issue facing the planet, that it's not in anyone's best interests to continue to promote fossil fuels.

But also, I'm very concerned about the effect that this could have on our drinking waters and our creational waters because of persistent

problems with leaks or other pipelines across the country.

And then additionally, while I appreciate the fact that building pipelines does create some temporary work, pipelines typically do not create a lot of long-term jobs, whereas transitioning our energy into green energy doesn't just make short-term jobs, but makes full-time careers, and I think it's ultimately better for our economy.

MR. JOHN LANDRETTI: My name is John Landretti, J-O-H-N, L-A-N-D-R-E-T-T-I. I'm a Roseville resident. I'm here to voice my strong opposition to the alternate pipeline.

I believe that, as a business, Enbridge owes it to the common good to clear out the old pipeline 3, practice good stewardship, and not simply abandon the line, which I consider irresponsible and unethical, and against the common good and public legacy.

I am deeply concerned about the abandonment of pipeline 3, because of the pollution risks to the environment.

Regarding the new proposed alternate
line, I believe that Enbridge's reputation and track
record does not justify their claims that the line

is safe.

I cite the 1991 massive oil spill that dumped 41 tanker cars worth of fuel and oil into the river and numerous other locations.

In addition, I support the Native

American position to honor treaty rights and their
wishes that these pipelines not cross vulnerable
wetlands in their area.

Again, I've come here at considerable effort because of the strength of my feelings based on what I've read and what I've heard from other people. Thank you for this opportunity.

MS. REGINA BIRCHEM: I read the Executive Summary and select parts of the DEIS for Enbridge's Line 3 proposal.

I am absolutely opposed to a new Line 3.

I'm opposed to abandoning and even continuing to use the present Line 3.

The DEIS lists and sometimes provides data on many important issues, such as: Impact on wildlife, water quality, soil -- water quality, soil and air, social and environmental justice, treaty rights, climate change.

In spite of identifying these critical issues, the overall bias of the statement is to

accept another pipeline as inevitable, even though it impinges negatively, economically and socially, on the people of Minnesota and beyond.

Challenges and perils of rapidly changing climate and political situations -- never faced previously by the people of Minnesota -- are speedily coming upon us with both certainty and unpredictability.

My four points: We really don't need any more oil. Processing Canadian heavy tar sands crude oil is not currently profitable.

Number 2, based on unclear and conflicting data in Chapter 5, estimates of life-cycle greenhouse gas emissions for heavy crude transport by Line 3 over the span of 30 years is shockingly high.

Just for greenhouse gas emissions, \$287 billion.

The present Line 3 has been in place about 50 years. So if Enbridge is still viable, it is likely that a projected new line would be used longer than 30 years.

Number 3, if Enbridge cannot or chooses not to remove the old Line 3 pipeline safely, then why install a larger Line 3 carrying even more

hazardous heavy crude.

Enbridge claims it will monitor the abandoned Line 3 indefinitely. How long will Enbridge exist? The cost of removal of Line 3 is estimated at \$1.28 billion. The cost of abandoning it is \$85 million.

What about all the old pipelines? Who will pay for their removal and mitigation of damage.

The fourth point, the applicant's preferred route will lead to a permanent destruction and fragmentation of forested and wetland habitats in northern Minnesota, an area already challenged markedly by climate change.

This is stated clearly as permanent damage to the forest in the executive summary and is stated clearly in the EIS.

In closing, a week ago I stood, as many of you have, on the North Shore of Lake Superior in awe of the vastness and beauty of the world's largest body of fresh water.

Minnesotans share an enormous responsibility to protect water and our priceless resources. We can no longer employ destructive processes that can not be reversed for short term monetary gain by any company or individual.

University of Minnesota scientists
throughout the state, including in Ely, Minnesota,
are trying to assess the unexpected effects of
climate change, such as, for example, high
horizontal winds that can remove a whole forest in a
short time. The forests do not recover.

MR. ROWAN GLASER: My name is Rowan Glaser, R-O-W-A-N, G-L-A-S-E-R.

I'm an artist and author, and I would like to say that I would appreciate an environmental impact study on abandoning the other line, the old line. We don't need anything else besides that. It would be nice to find out how they're planning to dispose of that line.

Last year the Sandpiper pipeline was rejected because it was hazardous to the citizens of St. Paul, Minneapolis.

This new Line 3 that's proposed is no less hazardous, especially to the people that live up north.

Besides, it will cross both the
Mississippi and the St. Croix Rivers, and I know the
Mississippi River is the drinking source for both
St. Paul and Minneapolis.

MS. JOAN HUGHES: Joan Hughes. This is

my concern: We have alternatives for energy that are cost effective now. Examples would be solar and wind, and they're also safe for the environment.

If you poll people, they're all for renewable energy. What we don't have an alternative for is our lands, our water, our air, and the effect of leaking pipes, and also the use of them that leads to climate change.

The use of fossil fuels, and especially the tar sands, because the amount puts more CO2 into the atmosphere than other forms.

So I'm very worried about our loss of precious resources in central Minnesota having pipelines going through. It's beautiful territory.

And I spend a lot of time outside.

I think we as Minnesotans could do better, and I think there should be a lot more thorough investigation from an Environmental Impact Statement.

MR. BRIAN QUINLAN: Enbridge provides very good employment in the community and enables their employees to -- I just want to say that Enbridge provides -- Enbridge is a good employer to the community. They stress safety, integrity, and respect, and I'm very proud to work for them.

MS. LAURA DEAN: Laura Dean, and I am a public health student at the U of M in nutrition, and I'm concerned about the impacts, the environmental impacts of this pipeline. And I believe that the statement is written biased toward Enbridge. I would like to see it geared more towards the environment. I think it directly impacts indigenous people in the land, and I think we need to look at that more seriously.

And the EIS actually gave several clauses for Enbridge in addressing potential spills but they seem to also leave an option for them to not address it all.

And I don't believe that the same considerations are given on an environmental stance in terms of the impact on the wetlands and wetland restoration, and I think that a spill is too risky.

It's one-fifth of our water, if one were to get into Lake Superior, and I think we need to protect our long-range vision of the environment and our health as a state, the people in the state, and the people on the land.

I'll guess that's all I'll say -- I also believe this means -- I'll just read this: Table 12, the spill sites' comparison, is measuring the

risk for trained spills, based on data from 2007 to 2017.

The EIS should more accurately measure the comparative risk of these three methods of oil transportation by considering improvements in rail technology, safety, and regulation that will inevitably proceed the lifetime of a new pipeline that assumes risk of train transportation is likely to change.

In addition, spill data for pipelines should include data specific to the applicant's history.

Chapter 2, section 8.33, in regards to spill response training. The DEIS states that Enbridge has indicated that their training programs exceed the standard.

I recommend that the statement be stricken from the EIS as it is partial to the applicant, or that if that statement remains, more details in reference to examples be given.

In addition, this section of the EIS should look at previous spills in the applicant's pipelines and the correlating response statistics, and that includes -- that would include a spill in 1991, in Minnesota, which is the largest inland

spill, as well as a spill in Kalamazoo, Michigan.

Another concern was the time period in which these permits go forward. I believe it's 30 years. They look at 30 years, and many of the pipeline catastrophes that happen are just beyond 30 years.

So I believe the reference range should be a lot wider and look at more time.

I think more examples need -- more specifics should be included in the EIS about the soil restoration of the wetlands and in terms of the top soil management, and the impact of the wetlands.

And I believe that the process should more directly involve the native communities on the lands that do not just mention them and check the box, but actually respect that this breaks the treaty on two -- at least two native reservations in northern Minnesota.

MR. DWIGHT ENGEN: Dwight Engen, Chaska, Minnesota.

I'm in favor of the proposed Line 3 pipeline. One, I think it's for the economy.

I believe that we need to move more towards energy independence, and I think having safe, well-maintained pipelines is the answer for

that future independence.

Also, these are great construction jobs.

I work in the construction industry and our people that I work with make a lifetime off of building pipelines and maintaining them so they're the safest and the most reliable form of energy, as far as oil and natural gas.

So in a nutshell, I would urge that the PUC and the decision-makers move forward on the project and don't waste too much time, as I think time is of the essence.

Minnesota is blessed to have access to refineries such as the Enbridge refinery but also we have the Koch refinery plant, which I think is called something else. It's called -- the Koch refining plant, and these are really good jobs for Minnesotans. And I believe having the refineries here gives us better control of our future for energy.

MR. JOHN SQUIRES: My name is John Squires, and I'm here to oppose the Line 3 pipeline specifically because it endangers water and indigenous sovereign treaty rights.

I think that one of my big suggestions is that there be an option to say no to the new

pipeline and to remove the old one.

It seems like the only option so far is to either leave the old one in the ground and keep using it or build a new one.

It seems like there should be an option to stop the old nasty one and not replace it at all.

Because tar sands is so toxic, and we're living in a dying planet and adding more tar sands in a pipeline is just going to make it worse.

That's all.

MS. ALYSSA WHITING: Alyssa Whiting.

Why move forward with outdated technology when we have sustainable sources to advantage instead? Why move forward with a project that only benefits a small group of people at great cost to the rest of us and the environment.

Line 3 represents another major environmental impact before it's even begun. Tar sands' landscapes are completely irrecoverable.

Minnesota waterways must be protected.

We now have renewable profitable sources of energy. We should not use this dirty, outdated source.

MS. MARGARET KIELTY: My name is Margaret Kielty.

I have several comments, I guess. One is for my husband, who asked me to ask about this.

Does the management have a quality assurance plan to maintain corrosion protection for preventing leakage.

Electric DC current, are they going to implement it? Are they going to guarantee to monitor it? He's worried about the safety of the pipeline.

My comment is I'm not -- I have two comments. Enbridge is a Canadian company. Why don't they run it across Canada and out that way? Why run it through Minnesota? I think they should just run it through Canada, if they want to do that.

The other thing is we have some farmland up in that area. It's beautiful. We put it in all conservation and natural wildflowers for 20 years, and it would be devastating if it damaged the area. The area is so beautiful.

They have no right to do that. Our farm has been in the family for a hundred years. I want to make sure it's not trashed. So I feel very strongly not to do it. And if they have to do it, do it through Canada.

My husband wants to make sure they're

totally up with all their safety precautions, not have any leaks.

MS. EMILY MOORE: Emily Moore. I live in Minneapolis.

What I want to say is that I tried to study the documents that the hearing is about, and I especially focused on the Certificate of Need information. And I may not have read everything.

This is what I want the Public Utilities

Commission to know. I may not have read everything,

but my understanding is the Certificate of Need -
do you need the project? Not just which route it's

going to take.

Do you need a pipeline, to begin with?

And that is where the Public Utilities Commission should begin.

Now, I'm feeling that the people that established the Public Utilities Commission had in mind that their, the Commission would consider environmental and economic issues, having to do with utilities.

And in this day and age, when we know -when we as a society know if we pay attention to the
science, we know that we cannot continue to use oil,
and especially not the oil that eventually would

come to this pipe, to Line 3 from Canada.

We cannot use that resource and still have a climate that people can live in, let alone -- we don't know who would be able to -- what species will even be able to survive climate change if all of the tar sands are just willy nilly used without being responsible. And to build a pipeline that can last for 50 years, with the company that built it expecting to send oil through it, is just -- I just cannot wrap my mind around how the Public Utilities Commission could faithfully and responsibly execute their duty and still not consider, not even have that part of the Certificate of Need process.

Do we need this at all? You can tell already that my opinion is that we do not need it. Because we know that wind and solar are already dropping so far in price that the oil that's coming through the pipeline will not be able to compete with electricity and wind driven modes of transportation.

And I should also say that I'm sure the Commission is aware of this. I'm aware of how much improvement there has been in battery storage, and that is going to wipe out the argument that, "Oh, we need this other fuel because the sun doesn't always

shine and the wind doesn't always blow."

The storage is amazing, potential for batteries is amazing, and therefore, that makes a potential stranded asset of this big pipeline with nowhere, nothing to carry.

And that doesn't even touch -- nothing that I've said has even touched the damages of oil, to begin with, being transported at either place.

I want us to put our money -- I want the world to be investing in the new technology of batteries, wind, solar, and all of the technologies that are available to us in energy efficiency.

We have not begun to tap into the efficiency that all of our buildings and our homes could experience.

So I implore the Commission to be the responsible service that they have pledged to be and consider that the Certificate of Need also extends to whether we need the oil at all.

MR. BRADLEY BLACKETT: My name is Bradley Blackett, and I'm from Apple Valley, Minnesota. I'm here today as a guardian of future generations.

We are here to ensure that you perform your public duty to ensure ecologically healthy land, water, and air for the benefit of future

generations.

We protect what we deem most important -our children, your children, and our grandchildren.
The critical responsibility of government is to
protect the public trust, because we have good
government, bad government, efficient government.

We have governments of different philosophies, but the U.S. is a democratic society, and we pride ourselves on that, but too often we think of our government as three branches: The executive, the judicial, and the elected legislative branch.

But the most important branch that barely gets attention is the fourth branch, which is the people. And so I want to make sure that we live up to the true democracy and that we live up to that responsibility.

I'm going to return to the script. Maybe the argument isn't whether government should be big or small, but whether they can fulfill this duty, this duty of protecting the commons.

When the economy and the corporate profits become more of a focus than the health of the environment, we become concerned.

It isn't the basis -- isn't it the basis

of a healthy economy, a healthy planet with healthy people? And when the air and the waters become more and more polluted and we destroy our lands, what is our future? What legacy are we leaving to our children.

We the people need you to be a guardian, a public trustee, a morale force, hold sacred our public health and well-being. Your role is to protect the common spaces so we can breathe clean air and drink clean water.

Proposals for pipelines are evaluated on the alleged environmental model. The public has to pay for the gambles of business when they pollute the environment.

I'd like to share a concept called the precautionary principle, which is used widely across Europe and other developed countries.

When an activity raises threats of harm to human health or the environment, precautionary measures should be taken even if some cause and effect relationships are not fully established scientifically.

That is, in the face of harm and scientific uncertainty, we must take action to prevent harm. The precautionary principle tells us

to act ethically and protect future generations; not wait until the evidence is complete.

The question in the case of Line 3 is, do we know enough to act? The answer is, of course, yes. True democratic engagement requires the free prior informed consent of a community affected by a decision.

The community should have the right to say yes or no to things that affect their future.

And we say no to this pipeline.

So as you consider the proposal before you, make it your responsibility to take into account how it affects everything -- excuse me, every being's right to clean air, water, healthy land, no matter what our race, ethnicity, or social economic status.

On behalf of all future generations, we thank you for standing on the side of love or justice.

MS. LAURA TRIPLETT: My name is Laura Triplett. I'm a professor of geology at Gustavus Adolphus College.

I am concerned that this EIS -- this DEIS does not take into full account the impacts of increased green earth gas emissions.

Specifically, it doesn't think broadly enough about economic costs of warming. Those costs need to be assessed both in Minnesota, but more broadly, at the national and planetary scale, and at a length of time beyond 30 years.

I understand it's difficult to partition warming into one pipeline versus other missions sources -- emission sources.

The DEIS acknowledges an increase in CO2 emissions, but doesn't take the next logical step to assess the true cost to our state and country.

As a geologist, I study climate change all the time, and have stepped beyond my comfort zone as a scientist to begin advocating for what I think is a more rational and sustainable policy future.

Building this pipeline is not a more rational and sustainable policy future for Minnesota.

MR. MIKE BUBALO: Mike Bubalo. I believe the pipeline will create many good paying local jobs, will put a lot of Minnesotans to work.

The laborers and the 49ers have state of the art training centers that are training hundreds and hundreds of hours each year on pipeline safety and pipeline work.

MR. STEVE LELCHUK: My first name is Steve, S-T-E-V-E, Lelchuk, L-E-L-C-H-U-K.

So I want to address chapter 10, section 5, which is Spill Prevention Preparedness and Response, and my question is, to what extent will this pipeline be vulnerable to cyber attack, which could cause a catastrophic accident.

Number one, pipelines are industrial scale systems run in large part by sophisticated hardware and software technology. I specifically have in mind in this case, something called supervisory control and data acquisition or SCADA.

According to Wikipedia, and I quote,
"Supervisory control and data acquisition is a
controlled system architecture that uses computers,
network data communications, and graphical user
interfaces for high level process supervisory
management, but uses other peripheral devices, such
as programmable logic controllers and discrete" -and this is all caps -- "PID controllers to
interface to the process plant or machinery.

"Stuxnet" -- that's spelled S-T-U-X-N-E-T
-- "the cyber attack on Iran's nuclear enrichment
systems, that came to the world's attention in 2010,

was directed exactly against their SCADA system.

"Many of the components of that malware have since escaped into the wilds of the Internet, available to any reasonable savvy computer user."

And in fact according to a 2016 article on the website, security intelligence, and I quote, "Attacks targeting industrial control systems increased over 110 percent in 2016, over last year's numbers as of November 30th.

"Furthermore, in March of 2017, on the website, cbr online, Eugene Kaspersky, the founder of Kaspersky Lab, noted that of 13,000 industrial control systems connected to the Internet, 90 percent have known vulnerabilities and 30 percent of these are in the U.S."

Now, in the Draft EIS, section 10.5.2.3, there is a reference to, "The existing Enbridge supervisory control and data acquisition system, which can automatically initiate pump station shutdowns to maintain safe operating pressures."

So we know Enbridge is using these industrial control systems and we know they are vulnerable to attack.

It seems to me that the Draft EIS needs to directly address this serious potential threat to

the pipeline's integrity. No doubt Enbridge is working hard to plug any holes in its cyber security, as are we all.

However, we all know this is somewhat of an ongoing slug fest between cyber good guys and cyber bad guys.

I find myself quoting Dirty Harry, "Do you feel lucky."

MR. DAN BRADY: Dan Brady. The Enbridge Line 3 replacement, it's not about adding a new line, it's about replacing an old line that is substandard.

We're not going to be doing anything besides replacing a line that is at a greater risk to the general public and to the environment with improved technology and improved design.

In the meantime, that will add members jobs. And I represent over 10,000 members.

We also do things from all sources of energy, whether it be solar, wind, natural gas.
We've got members that do all of these different things.

We're all for alternative ways to get things done. Unfortunately, the way it sits now, petroleum is very much a part of our lives and will continue to be because of the products that we use.

Everybody here used petroleum in some way or form to get here, whether it be on a car, a bike, whatever the case, they still used some type of petroleum -- whether it was the asphalt that they got here on, that they drove on, the pens that they're using to take notes, the cell phones that they're using to do research on what everybody else was saying.

I am for this pipeline because it's a better way to get oil from one spot to another, the safest way to get oil from one spot to another.

And the original Line 3 needs to be replaced. For too long this nation has always thrown Band-Aids over things that needed a complete repair. We see it all the time just in Minnesota's infrastructure, whether it be roads, bridges, highways, streets, throw a Band-Aid on it.

Just fill the pothole up with some hot tar and call it good, instead of addressing the real problem behind it. It sits there and after a little while that hot tar comes out and you got a bigger pothole now.

Why not create new versus keep throwing Band-Aids on things? It never seems to get done.

MR. JOEL SMITH: Joel Smith. I'm with the Laborers International Union of North America or just Laborers Union.

I'm for the pipeline. It brings better technology, newer technology, makes it safer than the existing line, safer for the environment. It creates well-needed jobs in the northern part of the state.

All the mines have closed so there's a lot of welding and good paying jobs it would create for that area. It will make it safer to transport oil.

MS. JESSICA MONETTE: Jessica Monette. I am the proud daughter and sister of the people of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa, an Anishinaabe from North Dakota, who had the privilege to assist the other courageous mothers and sisters that lobbied the cause to make our tribe the first sovereign Indian nation to legally divest as a tribal entity against any and all practices related to the industrial activity of fracking.

We joined Pennsylvania and the country of France as the first three government entities banning the dangerous, archaic, and ultimately unnecessary activity.

We saw firsthand how it decimated our brothers' and sisters' resources at the Ft. Berthold reservation, as we exported millions of dollars of our own subsidized water to aid them when their aquifers were polluted by the Bakken, costing this tribe tens of millions of dollars where no surrounding jurisdiction or corporate entity offered any due recompense because they weren't legally obligated to do so.

The fact that our jobs as Anishinaabe, as native American neighbors coexisting in and of our environment, to protect the water is a reality that has been exploited in this conversation to distract away from what the real issue is here at work: The rights of corporate personhood over the Human Rights of the people and the rights of the surrounding environmental resources.

While the police forces from my present home county, Hennepin, gladly took an interest-free loan for tens of millions of dollars in exchange for the opportunity to practice war drills via the frivolous enactment of EMAC in October 2016, on our peaceful protectors at Standing Rock, Energy Transfer Partners continue to illegally build -- Energy Transfer Partners continued to illegally

build on in the dark of night while the trope of the, "beaten noble savage," played out in the foreground.

I'm currently in charge of both my
parents' tribal probates in Turtle Mountain, which
includes trust lands in Montana or what's left of
the legacy of divesting from federal government
treaties as a descendent of the Chief Little Shell
Clan.

Despite constant weekly management of all activity on my parents' properties, I was notified four months after the fact, via a random email that I found in my spam, about activities that would be -- that I would find to be in preparation of drilling and setting pipe in Montana; skirting all federal and state mandates regarding the legal protocols appropriate for engaging tribal heirs.

It's no secret that pipeline projects such as Line 3 are MLPs or master limited partnerships. Complicated investments involving numerous large scale investors, i.e. big banks, were the main quantifier of ensuring ROI is merely to continue the pipelines build-out.

This isn't a question of creating jobs -it's not a question of creating jobs. Move that

labor train towards green energy, fixing our crumbling infrastructure. There's plenty of work to be had there.

Is Minnesota going to be the next casualty allowing corporate America to senselessly steamroll in legacy because money convinced them to.

LAURA HUEPENBECKER: Laura Huepenbecker, L-A-U-R-A, H-U-E-P-E-N-B-E-C-K-E-R. Good evening, thank you for the opportunity to speak. I'll focus my testimony on the contemporary need of Line 3.

I was born in 1997. According to climate data collected since 1880, the ten hottest years on record have occurred since I was one years old. I haven't known anything but global warming and climate change, so I suppose I'm coming to testify with a bit of a learning curve.

But I've also been born into a period of an unprecedented rate of change and an exponential technological growth.

Ever since elementary school, I was told my generation boasts a new title of digital natives. The first batch of learners who grew up with digital technology who are bringing creative and technological expertise to tackle our world's challenges in a way we have never seen before.

Minnesota's future employees, managers, engineers, and policymakers have quite literally been wired to constantly consider modern solutions while being forced to recognize the global implications of our immediate actions.

I'm here representing a generation of enthusiastic and practical citizens who look to change the future instead of duplicating the antiquated and unrealistic ways of the past. Tar sands pipelines are a tool of the past.

Minnesota has no need for this pipeline. We are already importing more than we need to satisfy oil demand. The U.S. has begun to export oil, in fact.

Specifically in Minnesota, fuel demand was down 19 percent in 2016, compared to its 2004 peak.

Tools of our future, like higher efficiency cars and alternative energy, are truly driving our market.

We do not need to violate treaty rights.

The United States and Minnesota have had a long
history of violating rights and oppressing native

Americans.

Line 3 will take us back to the shameful

past instead of leading us to a future of inclusivity and respect for the law.

I am speaking as a young voice, but I'm also representing the voice of our technological, corporate, and political future. We do not need foreign tar sands oil to fuel our cars and heat our homes.

Growth of renewable energy continues to outpace fossil fuel additions, at the same time consumers are paying less.

We have sparked solutions today that protect our waters, protect our rights, and sustain a secure energy future.

Line 3 moves us backwards to the industrial revolution of the 18th century in a unique and exciting time where we do not need to replicate the past to be energy secure.

I urge the Department of Commerce to not grant a Certificate of Need and consider more realistic and practical energy choices that acknowledge what our current market and citizens demand.

MR. RAYMOND DEHN: I am a member of the Minnesota House of Representatives. I currently represent, in my district, 45,000 people.

One of my primary concerns is the more than 1.5 million people that actually get their drinking water from the Mississippi River and the impact that they -- even a medium-sized incident could have on those individuals as far as clean drinking water.

I think it's critical that the DEIS should include as part of its scope the removal and the restoration of land of any abandoned lines, and ultimately include in the analysis the future costs of removing of the new lines which may be constructed.

Also, that Enbridge should be required to carry a bond or escrow dollars for those future removal of lines should a time come when they will not be using the line anymore.

In addition, the State requires that the Department of Commerce -- State requirements require the Department of Commerce to use an independent evaluation in much of the existing DEIS cites, primarily Enbridge analysis of the impact of the line.

We heard that the firm that is hired to prepare this DEIS has stated that the study does not adequately address the scope of this analysis and

what that should be.

So I would ask that the Chamber of
Commerce in the state reconsider the status of this
DEIS and go back in and completely scope the project
and do the analysis necessary for not only the
impact on indigenous lands but also the impact that
it could have on fresh water, the life for many
people in the state of Minnesota.

DR. TIFFANY BECKMAN: I'm Dr. Tiffany Beckman, and I'm an enrolled member of the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe, and I'm a descendent of the White Earth Nation, and an adopted member of the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe.

I'm also a physician and the first

American Indian adult endocrinologist in the nation
and board-certified in general internal medicine as
well.

So I have deep concerns about the health of current and future generations with regard to the pipelines. I also have quite a bit of tax and trust land that my name is on in northern Minnesota on Leech Lake reservation.

My trust land is held in trust by the United States Department of the Interior, and therefore, there may be some jurisdictional issues

here that need to be resolved.

I want the existing pipeline removed from Bena, Minnesota, where my land is and I don't want any more pipelines to go through the entire state of Minnesota.

It is not acceptable just to go around the reservations. I don't think there should be any more pipelines here in Minnesota. The health concerns are obvious. Leukemia, lymphoma, cancer, diabetes, just to name a few.

I think we need to preserve our 10,000 lakes in the land and the manoomin, the wild rice.

There is no money that will ever make me change my mind, and it would be unlawful not to get my consent, being a landowner, on the pipeline issue. If there is a violation of my wishes, the United States Department of Interior will be contacted, as will my lawyers.

I already have a lawyer working on the case. Thank you.
