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MR. WILLIS ANDY JOHNSON: Willis Andy Johnson. W-I-L-I-S, A-N-D-Y, Johnson.

Well, I've got along good with the Lakehead for, I don't know, it's 30 years, I suppose. And I know they were real helpful to me one time. I got stuck out in there and the crew came by and unhooked the big machine and helped me get out of the mud hole. And they said no charge. And I offered to pay them, but they said no way. They just done it. And I've never had no trouble with them. Never.

That's about it.

MR. JOHN SENS: My name is John Sens, S as in Sam, E-N-S. I live at 101 East 6th Street in Newfolden, Minnesota 56738.

I am completely in favor of the pipeline going through because, in my opinion, all forms of transportation of goods or people involves some degree of risk. I walked down here today, I guess I took a risk crossing the highway.

My experience before I retired, I was a lawyer handling the defense of civil cases. They involved airplanes, motor vehicles, cars, trucks, in one case a river boat. But I've never seen much having to do with pipelines.

And I've been experienced with pipeline people since about 1946 when I was in school as a first or second grader in a little town in northeast To me, the most important consideration Missouri. for this pipeline is public safety. And based on my experience and based on what I'm reading, I feel that transportation of oil or whatever this pipeline is going to carry is much safer than any other form of transportation that might be used, such as railroads, which have derailments all the time, tanker trunks, which have accidents all the time, or any other forms that might come up. So for those reasons, for safety, for public safety, that is the reason I totally support this pipeline effort.

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MR. JAMIE KYLE NELSON: Jamie Kyle Nelson. J-A-M-I-E, K-Y-L-E, N-E-L-S-O-N.

Since 1999 I've lived right across the road from the Viking pipeline station. And the pipeline has always been courteous. The workers have been great to me, they have been good neighbors.

I support the new pipeline, proposed pipeline. I think they're great for the community of Viking, they've donated vehicles and money. They

paid a huge amount of taxes and I think it would be a shame for the state to deny the pipeline to go through.

I would like to see on that chart that shows the accidental crude oil releases, I would like to see a chart that showed the amount of gallons released for, you know, like per million barrels pumped, so that I could compare the amount of gallons that actually leaked between the rail, the pipeline, and trucks based on how much oil is actually transferred so you can see the amount released per million barrels, or however they wanted to do it. I think that would be helpful, to see the comparison between rail, pipeline, and trucks.

So, and that's all on the comments, I guess.

MS. JILL HALL: I'm Jill Hall. I grew up, Lakehead Pipeline went right through my dad's farm. And we've never had a problem with it. And I live by a highway and a railroad track that has an awful lot of tanker trains going by and my opinion is that you can't replace the pipeline with trucks and railroads because it's not possible. There would be too many trucks on the road and it would

ruin the roads and kill people, accidents.

So anyway, I'm in support of it. Because as long as people want to use oil it's going to get from one place to another and I think the safest combination can figure out it's the best deal. And so I guess that kind of sums it up.

And it's already there. We're not going to take it out. I mean, somebody's idealist thinking, we don't need to transport oil or use oil anywhere, but they're using it themselves. So, anyway, I guess that pretty much sums my opinion on it.

And I've been to a lot of pipeline safety meetings where they explain how they keep tabs on and check their lines and it's very interesting.

And they ask for people to report if they do see anything unusual or, you know, in their right-of-ways and stuff. So as far as I can remember, what few accidents I remember were usually man, caused by man that dug a little too deep or something. Yeah.

So I guess that pretty much sums up my opinion.
